Lesson Plan 1: What are the barriers to education?

Key question	Activity	Timing
What are the barriers to	 Read students the introduction section of the 'Quality Education' page. 	5 min
education?	 Split the class into 5 groups. Assign each group a reason why people might not be able to get a quality education. These are 'Gender', 'Special Educational Needs', 'War', 'Hunger', and 'Poverty'. 	3 min
	Ask each group to nominate a presenter and scribe.	3 min
	 Give each group an A1 sheet of sugar paper and some coloured felt pens. Ask students to use the relevant section on the SuperKind website to make a poster on their assigned reason. Signpost students to the SuperKind 'Make a Poster' toolkit. 	15 min
	 Ask each group to present their ideas to the class. After each presentation, invite the class to ask the group questions. 	20 min

Lesson Plan 2: What needs to be done to achieve Quality Education for all?

Key question	Activity	Timing
What needs to be done to achieve Quality Education for all?	• Ask students to raise their hand to put forward ideas as to how they think education can be made available to all. Depending on the time you have available, and the students' reading and writing abilities you could invite students who have shared their idea with the class to write it on the whiteboard, or you could write them out yourself. Encourage students to develop their ideas by asking further questions. For example, if a student cites 'money' as a method of improving access to education, ask them where the money might come from, and what it might be spent on. Engage the rest of the class by asking if they have anything to add to their classmate's idea.	10 min
	 Cross-check the students' ideas with the SuperKind website by reading through the 'Solution' section together. As you read, attempt to place the students' earlier contributions within the context of the site. 	10 min

Lesson Plan 3: What can we do to achieve Quality Education for all?

Key question	Activity	Timing
What can we do to achieve Quality Education for all?	Note: Before this class you will need to have secured permission from the head of the school, chosen the dates of the donation drive, and spoken to a charity of your choice (we suggest looking at Books2Africa). • Inform the class that together you are going to organise a book donation drive.	5 min
	 Introduce the children to your chosen charity. Provide them with some information, either via the website, a video, or a print-out. 	5 min
	 Explain the roles involved. Roles could include: Making posters to tell people about the book donation drive Making posters with arrows towards the donation drive location Making a poster to go next to the donation location Speaking in assembly Writing to parents 	10 min
	Assign students to roles.	5 min
	 Show students where to find toolkits to help with their respective roles on the SuperKind website. 	2 min
	 Give students time to plan and execute their role. Roam the class offering guidance to those in need. 	30 min
	Note: After the collection has taken place you will need to organise for the donated books to be taken to your chosen charity. Many charities will offer help with collection or postage of the books, but in the event that this is not feasible parents have, in the past, been very willing to help.
